The Heritage Days events in September attracted a number of visitors and the walk around the Old Town led by our Secretary, Tony Snow, on the Saturday appealed to some 25 persons. The former Slipper Baths (now the East Kent ITeC Training Centre) in Victoria Road, Margate, were also open to the public where much of the decorative original ironwork could be seen. Also included there was the former Margate Corporation mortuary in King Street. To see both these buildings put to such good use was most rewarding. The Baptist Church in Cecil Square was also open with a special display put on which told the history of this fine building. Also open were Margate's superb Arts & Crafts house Shottendane, St John's Church and the Waterloo Tower at Quex Park. If you haven't visited these buildings, do look out for Heritage Days next year when it is hoped that all these buildings will again be open to the public without charge. Heritage Days provide a magnificent opportunity to visit so many interesting buildings. Indeed, such is the choice available in our area and in neighbouring areas that a selection has to be made to accommodate as many as possible within the limited time available.

Finally, there is still no news about the re-opening of Margate Museum. Surely, this must be a high priority of Thanet District Council. \Box



Dippers & Dunkers Weekend 21st to 23rd August 2009



Thanet District Council's Dippers & Dunkers weekend of variety and burlesque events held in Margate from Friday 21st to Sunday 23rd August was a great success Indeed, it is reported that events will run for a whole week next year. Credit for organizing the weekend is due to the Council's Arts Development Officer - Heather Sawney. Well done Heather. Amongst the many attractions were the illusionist shows put on in the Old Town area. These were restorations of the types of shows that were laid on in Dreamland Amusement Park in the 1960s and included the Headless Lady, the Girl in a Goldfish Bowl and the Living Half Lady. Unlike the 1960s, there was no charge for admission to these shows over the festival weekend and it has been estimated that around 3,000 people queued up to see the shows. It was wonderful to see so much activity in the Old Town but it was very sad to see all those people filing past the now closed Margate Museum as the queue edged forward to see the shows. What a missed opportunity it was that all those people in the Old Town were denied the opportunity to visit what ought to be one of the town's major attractions. Margate Museum must surely be open again to visitors by next summer and long before next year's Dippers & Dunkers week. Ramsgate has got back its Ramsgate Museum, isn't it time that Margate got back its wonderful Museum now that the East Kent Maritime Trust has given up and the ball is back in Thanet District Council's lap?

But, back to Dippers & Dunkers. Among the many other events that weekend was a most fascinating talk on 'Lord' George Sanger given by Professor Vanessa Toulmin from the National Fairground Archive at the University of Sheffield. To a packed house, Professor Vanessa (as she is called) gave a PowerPoint presentation of some of the many thousands of superb images held by the National Fairground Archive relating to circuses generally and, in particular, to the Sanger circuses. Professor Vanessa comes from a long line of fairground entertainers and, notoriously, says that she "Ran away to Academia". Her background, her exhaustive knowledge of the subject and her unlimited enthusiasm produced an unforgettable talk. The following day, Professor Vanessa gave another talk, this time demonstrating the wide range of fairground acts that were popular during the nineteenth century and early twentieth

century. Again, her talk attracted a full house. This was Professor Vanessa's first ever visit to Margate and it proved a total success.

As part of the Dippers & Dunkers weekend of events, Paul Verrall led a tour of Margate Cemetery on Sunday afternoon with an important visit to the Sanger family plot where both 'Lord' George Sanger and his brother John Sanger, along with others members of the Sanger family, are buried.

All of the events mentioned above were free of charge. If you missed them this year, do make a point of looking out for them next year when, hopefully, Professor Vanessa with make a very welcome return visit to the town.







'Lord' George Sanger's funeral




'Lord' George Sanger was, for a short time, a member of Margate Town Council. He was one of the founders and the first President of the Beaconsfield Conservative Working Men's Association.

The cortege left Park Farm Finchley at around eight o'clock on the morning of Tuesday, 5th December 1911. It proceeded to the high road at East Finchley where it broke into a trot. Despite the heavy rain, large crowds had gathered at the major road junctions to say their final farewells. Down Highgate Archway, along the Holloway Road to The Angel, Islington, through Smithfield Meat Market on to Holborn Viaduct where the coffin and floral wreaths were entrained for Margate. Along the route, many who had gathered for the occasion bared their heads as the cortege passed. Members of the family travelled in a special saloon railway-carriage to Margate, together with friends of 'Lord' George Sanger, to pay a last tribute of respect to who was regarded by many as the world's greatest showman.

The train arrived at Margate West railway station (which stood approximately where Margate Station is today) at 12.48pm. At the railway station to meet the body was a large contingent of members of the Showmen's Guild and a great number of representatives of local organisations. It is reported that 50 carriages followed the

hearse. After leaving the station yard, the route was by way of Marine Terrace, past the Hall-by-the-Sea, along Elephant Hill (now known as Marine Gardens), up the High Street, to the Parish Church of St John the Baptist. After the funeral service at St John's Church, the cortege proceeded along Ramsgate Road before turning into College Road to Coffin House Corner and then on to St John's Cemetery (now known as Margate Cemetery) where a burial service was held at the Sanger family plot. The Isle of Thanet Gazette reported that not since the time of the surfboat disaster and the burial of the victims of that terrible catastrophe had such a crowd been seen at Margate Cemetery. There were 123 floral emblems including many from circus showmen from around the world.

The funeral arrangements were carried out by Messrs W R Dunkley, Westminster Bridge Road for London and by Messrs Gore Bros at Margate. The funeral car, mourning coaches and the carriages were supplied by Mr J W Sayer (the accompanying advertisement dates from 1903).

Our sincere thanks go to Richard Clements (author of two books on Old Margate and a member of our Society) for the loan of the superb postcards from his collection showing scenes of the funeral procession of 'Lord' George Sanger – one of the biggest funerals ever seen at Margate. From the numbers shown on the postcards, it is probable that a series of at least twelve different scenes was produced.

The end of the funeral procession at Coffin House Corner. The footprint of the building after which the corner was named was similar in shape to a coffin (being at the apex of the junction of College Road and Tivoli Road). Coffin House served as a shop for many years until the volume of traffic at that junction increased to necessitate the demolition of the building for roadwidening purposes. The junction is today sometimes wrongly referred to in local papers as 'Coffin Corner': its former closeness to Margate Cemetery is purely coincidental. Coffin House was demolished around 30 years ago since when the volume of traffic at that junction has increased even further to make it now one of the busiest road junctions in the town.



Letters to the Editor

Dear James

I read with interest your Editorial on the front page of the Margate Civic Society summer newsletter. I agree entirely with your sentiments about the irony of the Turner & Dickens (T&D) walking route going past the closed Margate Museum. I sincerely hope that funding becomes available soon to re-open the Museum.

Having read your Editorial, I obtained a copy of the T&D leaflet containing the route and decided, as I had a little time to spare, to follow its first stages. I was astounded (to put it mildly) as I made my way from Holy Trinity & St John's School to find that the route turned into Charlotte Square. I found myself passing numerous residences, a public house and a Chinese take-away instead of walking, as I had expected, through the grounds of our Parish Church of St John the Baptist which was at one end of the original footpath. This building is the oldest in the town and contains a veritable treasure trove of items of historical, artistic and cultural interest including Norman pillars, a Tudor font, a unique former treasury with battlements (later used as a gunpowder store), monumental brasses and other memorials which provide interesting snippets about the lives and deaths of people connected in some way with St John's Church and the town (not just the local dignitaries referenced on the leaflet!).

The Church is open at least every morning and often the children from Holy Trinity & St John's School as well as other visitors, including those who write books about historical buildings, come in to take a look around. Since its reordering, the Church also has cloakroom and kitchen facilities and folk in place specifically offer a warm welcome to any who might venture in. What is also puzzling about the Church being left out of the route is that it has been the subject of at least one painting by J M W Turner himself which is now in a private collection (see picture) and possibly others as well. I am quite sure that the artistic experts employed as part of the Turner project would be aware of this.

I am a member of the Margate Civic Society and also the Ministry Team at St John's and we very much looked forward to welcoming those walking the route and showing them around our Church, which is considered of sufficient interest for the Heritage Day tours. For St John's to be cut out of the T&D route is a huge disappointment to us and we would like to understand why this is so. I am writing to Derek Harding and several other people in the hope of obtaining a satisfactory answer. I am happy for you to publish this letter in the next Civic Society Newsletter if you feel it is appropriate, but would greatly appreciate it if you would raise this issue at your next Civic Society Committee Meeting.



My Margate Memories

Asked to write an article for the newsletter, I thought what would be of interest to our readers and also special to this area. Where better to start than the Royal Sea Bathing Hospital at Westbrook. It was founded in 1791 by Dr John Coakley Lettsom (it is said that he gave the sum of $\pounds 40,000 - a$ huge sum of money in those days) and is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, hospitals in the United Kingdom and was revolutionary in its treatment of sick people. It was all about getting them out in the clean sea air as part of the cure for TB. I remember as a very young girl seeing the patients outside with the raised cradles over their legs with a red blanket on top to take the weight. One old lady on a visit said there were rows of red racing cars lined up on the front. Obviously, she needed her eyes tested as well as her other ailments. The poor of London were sent down to get cured and a large number of them were. One of the most respected members of the Society, Mr Derek Austen, was a nursing tutor there for over 30 years and could tell you so much more than I can.

I was lucky enough to be at the 200-year ceremony of the Royal Sea Bathing Hospital when the Countess Mountbatten was the official guest of honour and was most charming. The little dolls were another unusual feature and were bandaged to represent the various operations the children had. I remember looking at them in the glass cases in reception at the QEQM Hospital. I understand that they are now stored at Margate Museum. I hope so as they are quite unique. Queen Victoria helped to put Margate on the map by getting the railway down here. I believe Dreamland was called the Hall-by-the-Sea. Sanger also got the town going with his showmanship and recently some of the animal cages have been rediscovered where these wretched creatures were kept – and we are supposed to be a nation of animal lovers!

Well folks, if this has been of any interest to you about our much loved town, let me know and I will try to come up with some more local snippets. Don't forget our next meeting on 1st October. I look forward to seeing you all there. Go in good health.



Copy of old map of Thanet recently sold at local auction



The above topographical map of Margate and its environs is a part of a larger hand-coloured copper-engraved map of the Isle of Thanet drawn by John Andrews and published in collaboration with Andrew Dury and William Herbert in 1769. Andrews was a leading geographer, land-surveyor, map-seller and engraver who published in London from around 1766 to 1809. In 1769, Andrews, Dury and Herbert published a set of 25 topographical maps in original outline colouring covering the whole of Kent on a scale of two inches to the mile. An original copy of Sheet Number 10 of the Kent series (from which the above is an extract) attracted a number of local bidders when it came up for sale at Westgate Auctions last year. It is interesting to see from the map how Margate has expanded over the last 240 years. But it is also interesting to see how many of the outlying hamlets still remain. By today's standards, the accuracy of much of the detail leaves a lot to be desired but, undoubtedly, in its day, the complete set of maps for the whole of Kent would have been regarded as a major step forward in recording the geographical aspects of our county and would have proved most valuable to travellers. The map shows the owner's name for many of the estates and it is likely that the inclusion of such detail was designed to further sales of the maps. Of course, Westgate-on-Sea did not exist in 1769 but it is interesting to note that what we know today as St Mildred's Bay (previously known in the 1860s as Marsh Bay) is shown on this map as Gol-gate Bay which is thought likely to have been named after a local farmer who collected sea-weed from that bay to use as manure on his fields – possibly a Mr Gol (or similar same). It is also interesting to see on the map that, at what is now known as Cliftonville, Walpole Bay is shown as Marsh Bay. Permission to photograph this map prior to its sale was very kindly granted by Colin Langston, Westgate Auctions' auctioneer. \Box

Founded in 1968, the Margate Civic Society is a registered charity. It is also affiliated to both the Kent Federation of Amenity Societies and the Kent History Federation.

The Society's purpose and aims are to encourage high standards of architecture and town planning in Margate and its environs (Birchington, Westgate-on-Sea, Cliftonville, Westbrook, Garlinge, Acol, Sarre and St Nicholas-at-Wade); to stimulate public interest and care for the history and character of the area; and to encourage the preservation, development and improvement of features of general amenity and historical interest. To this end, Town Pride awards are given annually to those buildings which have been refurbished, cleaned or modified and which, in the opinion of the Society, have enhanced the appearance of the town. New high-quality buildings are also eligible for the award. The Society also vets planning applications and makes known to Thanet District Council any objections to those applications which it considers necessary.

Evening meetings are held monthly between October and May at the Walpole Bay Hotel, Fifth Avenue, Cliftonville. The lectures, mostly illustrated with slides, are interesting and of local interest; they are also varied in their appeal. A few afternoon meetings are sometimes also held. A newsletter is published four times a year.
